CONTEXT

A Biblical view of fellowship is a broad topic. Its application could touch on many areas of your life—church, neighborhood, family, ministry, friends. However, this study will focus primarily on the areas which relate directly to your role as a Navigators staff.

<u>Staff Team</u>: The Nav staff on your campus: EDGE teammates, Campus Director, Trainer. It also includes those who labor alongside the team (alumni and volunteers) and your regional staff team.


<u>Campus Ministry</u>: We are trusting God to form diverse disciple making communities on our campuses. Students and student leaders need to experience fellowship with us and with one another so they can model it for a lifetime after graduation.

<u>Among the Lost</u>: Our calling includes living and discipling *among the lost*. As you complete the study, wrestle with how people may *belong* to your community before *believing*. How could your campus community model the love of Christ?



<u>06 LABS</u>

Labs take learning and put it into practice. This lab seeks to take what you're learning and infuse it into the campus ministry setting in order to deepen your practical understanding of the course material.

A) Hospitality Lab

Hospitality plays a key role in fellowship and community. This lab helps you understand many of the aspects that are involved in creating an environment where fellowship and community can thrive. One passage that captures many practical aspects of hospitality is found in Song of Solomon 2:10-13. In the following passage, Solomon describes an outing that he's going to take his darling on.

See if you can identify how many of the five human senses Solomon takes into account.

10 "My beloved (Solomon) responded and said to me, 'Arise, my darling, my beautiful one, And come along.11 'For behold, the winter is past, The rain is over and gone.12 'The flowers have already appeared in the land; The time has arrived for pruning the vines, And the voice of the turtledove has been heard in our land. 13 'The fig tree has ripened its figs, And the vines in blossom have given forth their fragrance. Arise, my darling, my beautiful one, And come along!'"

ASSIGNMENT

For this lab you're going to host some type of event for a gathering of three or more people. The event can be indoors or outdoors. It could be a dinner party, double date, dessert, sport activity, or whatever you desire. Please consider all the COVID policies that apply. Here's what to do:

- 1. **EVENT TYPE**: Prayerfully decide what type of event you would like to host. Keep in mind this lab is designed to help you show Christ-like hospitality to others. So consider an event that will allow you to show maximum hospitality.
- 2. **WRITTEN PLAN**: Develop a written plan for your event. Plan out your event by thinking through the experience from your guests' perspective. Put yourself in their shoes. Think through things like: parking, the timing of things, what activities you would like to include, what food or supplies are needed and keep some margin for the unexpected.
- 3. **CONSIDER ALL 5 SENSES**: Create at least five specific aspects of your event that intentionally appeal to each of your guests five senses. For example: A. Sight decorate the hosting area; B. Sound have nice music playing; C. Smell have nice candles lit in the eating area and bathroom; D. Taste provide a tasty meal; E. Touch cool down the indoor hosting area to accommodate for all of the 98 degree heaters that are about to arrive.
- 4. **PTD**: Establish a Place, Time, and Day (PTD) for your event. Without a PTD events don't happen. Check with the others who live with you to confirm that your PTD works for them.
- 5. **INVITATIONS AND RSVP**: There are several ways to do this, online, handwritten, text, evite, or email. You'll need to allow adequate time for people to receive the invitation, check their schedule, then respond to your invitation. Casual events can have casual invitations, but more formal events need to have more formal invitations.

- 6. **RECRUIT HELP:** When hosting an event there are usually three main pieces of hosting: Location, Socializing, Providing Food. For very small events of 3-4 people it's possible to do all three; however, when you're hosting more people you'll need more help. You can't do all three well, so pick two and delegate the other. (I've burned dozens of burgers during an event because I was trying to cook, run a slip-n-slide and talk to guests all at the same time). Choose two and don't put the pressure on yourself to do it all.
- 7. HOST YOUR EVENT: Put your prayer, planning and prep into action. Have fun and enjoy showing the love of Christ to people as you create an environment where fellowship and community can thrive.

B) Body of Christ Lab

Fellowship and community plays a key role in your growth as a believer. This lab helps you to understand how you have been impacted by the community in your life. God uses the body of Christ to challenge us, shape us and encourage us. There are many passages that focus on the role of the body of Christ. First Corinthians 12:12-27 gives us the value of different parts of the body and how they benefit each one of us. Notice the variety that God creates in the body and how critical it is.

"¹² Just as a body, though one, has many parts, but all its many parts form one body, so it is with Christ. ¹³ For we were all baptized by one Spirit so as to form one body—whether Jews or Gentiles, slave or free—and we were all given the one Spirit to drink. ¹⁴ Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many.

¹⁵ Now if the foot should say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. ¹⁶ And if the ear should say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," it would not for that reason stop being part of the body. ¹⁷ If the whole body were an eye, where would the sense of hearing be? If the whole body were an ear, where would the sense of smell be? ¹⁸ But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be. ¹⁹ If they were all one part, where would the body be? ²⁰ As it is, there are many parts, but one body.

²¹ The eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" And the head cannot say to the feet, "I don't need you!" ²² On the contrary, those parts of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, ²³ and the parts that we think are less honorable we treat with special honor. And the parts that are unpresentable are treated with special modesty, ²⁴ while our presentable parts need no special treatment. But God has put the body together, giving greater honor to the parts that lacked it, ²⁵ so that there should be no division in the body, but that its parts should have equal concern for each other. ²⁶ If one part suffers, every part suffers with it; if one part is honored, every part rejoices with it.

²⁷Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it.

ASSIGNMENT

For this lab you are going to reflect on 5 people that God has placed in your life that reflect the body of Christ and how fellowship with them has impacted you. This is meant for you to take time to realize how fellowship with believers has shaped your life.

- 1. Write out 5 names of people that have impacted you (three peers and two mentors).
- 2. Under each name answer the following questions:
 - How have they shaped you to know God in a deeper way?
 - How have they encouraged you in your faith?
 - How has God used them to challenge you to go beyond the places you are willing to go?
 - What joy have they brought to your life through this relationship?
 - How would your life be different if you have never been willing to experience fellowship with them?
- 3. Spend some time praying and thanking God for the fellowship that He has given you through each of these people.
