04 PAUL

Paul and his companions "wrestled" in prayer for the people of God (Col. 4:12). The Greek word used there is *agōnizomai* (meaning fight, compete, strive and is the root of our word agony)

A. Wrestling for people

Read Paul's prayers below and make observations regarding:

- the **time** Paul spent praying
- the **content** of his prayers for people
- any other **general** observations

Romans 1:8-10

First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is being reported all over the world. God, whom I serve with my whole heart in preaching the gospel of his Son, is my witness how constantly I remember you in my prayers at all times; and I pray that now at last by God's will the way may be opened for me to come to you.

1 Corinthians 1:4-9

I always thank God for you because of his grace given you in Christ Jesus. For in him you have been enriched in every way— in all your speaking and in all your knowledge—because our testimony about Christ was confirmed in you. Therefore you do not lack any spiritual gift as you eagerly wait for our Lord Jesus Christ to be revealed. He will keep you strong to the end, so that you will be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ. God, who has called you into fellowship with his Son Jesus Christ our Lord, is faithful

Philippians 1:9-11

And this is my prayer: that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight, so that you may be able to discern what is best and may be pure and blameless until the day of Christ, filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ—to the glory and praise of God.

Colossians 1:9-12

For this reason, since the day we heard about you, we have not stopped praying for you and asking God to fill you with the knowledge of his will through all spiritual wisdom and understanding. And we pray this in order that you may live a life worthy of the Lord and may please him in every way: bearing fruit in every good work, growing in the knowledge of God, being strengthened with all power according to his glorious might so that you may have great endurance and patience, and joyfully giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the kingdom of light.



Ephesians 1:15-20

For this reason, ever since I heard about your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love for all the saints, I have not stopped giving thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers. I keep asking that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the glorious Father, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and revelation, so that you may know him better. I pray also that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, and his incomparably great power for us who believe.

Ephesians 3:14-21

For this reason, I kneel before the Father, from whom his whole family in heaven and on earth derives its name. I pray that out of his glorious riches he may strengthen you with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith. And I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the saints, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God. Now to him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to his power that is at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, for ever and ever! Amen.

1 Thessalonians 3:-9-13

How can we thank God enough for you in return for all the joy we have in the presence of our God because of you? Night and day we pray most earnestly that we may see you again and supply what is lacking in your faith. Now may our God and Father himself and our Lord Jesus clear the way for us to come to you. May the Lord make your love increase and overflow for each other and for everyone else, just as ours does for you. May he strengthen your hearts so that you will be blameless and holy in the presence of our God and Father when our Lord Jesus comes with all his holy ones.

2 Thessalonians 1:11

With this in mind, we constantly pray for you, that our God may count you worthy of his calling, and that by his power he may fulfill every good purpose of yours and every act prompted by your faith.

05 LABS

Labs take learning and put it into practice. This lab seeks to take what you're learning and infuse it into the campus ministry setting in order to deepen your practical understanding of the course material.

A. PRAYER WALK LAB

Prayer walks have a way of connecting supplication with location. The concept is simple, pray and walk. Prayers said while walking aren't any more effective than prayers said while sitting, since God hears our prayers no matter what we're doing. Prayer walks can however bring greater clarity and connection to what we're praying for.

ASSIGNMENT

For this lab you're going to take a prayer walk for 45 minutes. You can do it alone or with others.

- 3. Go on your prayer walk around campus. You can choose the campus you're at or one that you're interested in praying for.
- 4. Optional: Log your prayer walk on the website, https://everycampus.com
- 5. Virtual Option: If Covid constraints or concerns limit your in-person availability, then here is a link for a virtual prayer walk: https://everycampus.com/our-strategy/prayer/virtual-prayer-walking/
- 6. Develop a Word Document that addresses these points:
 - Briefly describe your prayer walk. Where was it? When? Were you with anyone?
 - What were a few things that being at the location prompted you to pray for that you might not have normally prayed for if you weren't on location?
 - Did you happen to have any experiences that you sensed the Lord had orchestrated during your walk? For example: You're praying for a student and then happen to randomly run in to that same student.

B. JOHN 17 PRAYER LAB

Prayer plays a key role in your intimacy with Christ and your ministry to others. This lab is designed to help you grow in your understanding of prayer; specifically, prayer for those you are investing in. One passage that captures Jesus' heart for this is in John 17. Jesus is about to leave earth and is crying out to God on behalf of his disciples. Read the following passage and note how Jesus intercedes for the disciples. Also take note of His heart for these men and what types of things that He asks God for.

Read John 17:6-25

ASSIGNMENT

For this lab you are going to read through the prayer in John 17 and then rewrite verses 6-25 for those that you are discipling. This is meant to stimulate a Christ-like passion and practice for interceding on behalf of those God has placed in your sphere of ministry.

In a word document:

- 1. Read John 17.
- 2. Make observations of what Jesus prayed and who he prayed for
- 3. Make a list of names that you are investing in.
- 4. Rewrite the prayer of John 17 with these names in mind.
- 5. After you finish, take some extended time with God and pray through this prayer using specific names of the people that you are investing in.
